FROM THE DEAN

Professor Michael Quinlan

Welcome to the School of Law of the University of Notre Dame Australia in Broadway, Sydney (Notre Dame Law).

Choosing which degree and which university to study at are very difficult tasks. Making these decisions in an environment of uncertainty and disruption caused by a global pandemic is even harder. You have my sympathies. I am sure that you have thought very carefully about your decision to join us at Notre Dame Law. Thank you for choosing to study with us. I have no doubt that you have made the right decision and that you will enjoy the unique learning environment that is Notre Dame Law. We see the project that you are just beginning to be a ioint exercise to get you from where you are today to where you want to be when you graduate. Like any shared activity there are things that you can do and there are things that Notre Dame Law and the Notre Dame Sydney Law Society (NDSLS) can and will do for you. Let's start with what we can do for you.

What Notre Dame Law will do for you

We have a very special commitment to providing you with an excellent standard of training for the legal profession. In fact this is one of the specific demands that the Objects of the University make of us. In order to meet this requirement, uniquely of all law schools in Australia, all of our academic staff have experience working as lawyers, Canon lawyers or experts in environmental law in Australia or overseas. Most of your teachers have been partners in law firms with decades of legal experience. For example, before my appointment as Dean in 2013, I had the great privilege of working for over 23 years at Allens, where I was a partner for more than 14 vears. All of our teachers have made a conscious decision to teach here in order to help you do the best that you can.

Our law degree concentrates on developing not only a very sound knowledge of the academic discipline of the law but also some of the basic skills that lawyers need to be successful. We have a very clear focus on developing a deep knowledge of the fundamental building blocks of the law. Most of these are found in the "Priestley 11" courses which are mandatory for admission in all Australian States and Territories (they include torts, contracts, property, criminal law etc.).



Our students benefit from a real commitment of time and focus on these areas. We will provide you with practical skills such as advocacy, public speaking, commercial practice and alternative dispute resolution to better prepare you for a career in the law.

We will provide you with many opportunities to be mentored by practising lawyers and opportunities to undertake internships as part of your degree. We will also help you to think not just about what the law is, but about what it should be, and to develop lifelong learning skills. We will also provide you with weekly updates on career, mentoring, internship and volunteering opportunities, student and alumni successes and course information through our weekly newsletter, The Jury's In. I know you will have a lot of demands on your time and it can be easy to miss each week's The Jury's In but I really do encourage you to read it. Many of our students and alumni thank me for ensuring that we publish The Jury's In as they have found work or volunteering or other opportunities within its pages.

What the NDSLS will do for you

You are very lucky to be joining a law school with an incredibly proactive, enthusiastic and engaged student society. The NDSLS is a student body representing every student enrolled at Notre Dame Law. The NDSLS will enrich your student experience if you engage with its impressive website and Facebook site, participate in the competitions it runs in mooting, negotiation, client interviews and and other areas, read its Careers Guide and Student Guide and its regular newsletter, attend the Careers Week events and the social events and lectures it puts on including the Law Ball, the Annual Social Justice Lecture and Annual Women in Law Panel and help it to raise funds for charities and Non-Government Organisations.

What you can do for yourself

When you finish your degree employers will be interested in your academic results, in your work experience and in your other achievements. Think now about what those will look like when you write your first job application to work in the law. Plan ahead. Your academic results will make a difference to the range of options that you have when you

finish your degree. Work hard to achieve the best results that you can. Develop contacts in the law and gain experience in the law. Take advantage of the mentoring and internship opportunities we offer. Join or get involved in organisations where you will meet lawyers such as the Young Lawyers section of the NSW Law Society, the St Thomas More Society and political parties. Think of all the lawyers that you already know family, friends, family of friends and friends of family. Think of lawyers that you have a connection with lawyers in your local area, lawyers who went to your school, lawyers from your work, church, faith, sporting or other communities which you are part of. Get in touch with them. Learn about what they do. Ask whether they know of any lawyers looking to hire law students. Volunteer. Take up leadership roles. Get involved in the NDSLS, the community and build up your network of contacts in the law.

An international approach to studying law

At Notre Dame Law we recognise the impacts of globalisation on the law. This is why all of our law students must study at least one international law elective but each year there is more than one international law elective on offer and students can choose to take more international law electives. You can also study some of your law courses abroad. We are always looking to expand our offerings but to date most of our law students who have studied law abroad have studied classes, taught in English, in Lyon in France or in Maynooth in Ireland. The university has recently announced an exciting new relationship with the Catholic University of Paris which in French is known as the Institut Catholique de Paris (ICP).

Our first new program with ICP was the Master of Laws (coursework) (LLM) which commenced in Semester 2, 2020. Alongside this program we continue to offer three postgraduate research programs in law: the Master of Laws (Research), the Master of Philosophy (MPhil) and the Doctor of Philosophy (PhD). Even though you are just starting your university level legal studies you might like to start thinking about going on to further studies with us after completion of your Bachelor of Laws (LLB) combined or single degree. The LLM has an international law focus. Students can commence their LLM studies in semesters 1 or 2 and study the program full-time or part-time.

Students who enrol in this one year LLM will have the option of completing all of their studies with us but they may also choose to complete the second semester of their LLM at ICP. Notre Dame students who complete a semester of their LLM at ICP will receive a certificate of completion of a semester of studies from ICP as well as their LLM. The LLM has been designed to be flexible. The opportunities which it provides for overseas study of law in English in two Catholic Universities - one in Australia and one in France make the program unique. If you wish to go straight on to study the LLM after you complete your LLB you will need to complete your LLB with Honours, at a high credit level or be able to demonstrate relevant practical experience. So now you know what you need to do in the course you are about to take if you want to go straight on to study the LLM.

Our approach works

Law students from Notre Dame Law have the opportunity to compete in a wide range of competitions internally and externally. I encourage you to do so whilst you are with us. For a small school our law students achieve extraordinary results. The Quality Indicators in Learning & Teaching website collates external surveys of law students across all Australian universities and law schools. It is worth having a look at as you will see that the university and Notre Dame Law you are joining always rank extremely well in all of the areas that will impact on your study experiences and your future including Skills Development, Teacher Quality, Overall experience, Learner Engagement and Student Support. In short the evidence is in - Notre Dame Law is an excellent law school. You have made a great choice!

I look forward to writing and reading about your achievements as you become part of the Notre Dame Law success story. Enjoy your time here. It is a really friendly place and I am sure that you will make many lifelong friends at Notre Dame Law.

FIRST YEAR CORE COURSES

Legal History

As the name suggests, this course is centred around the history and development of the Australian legal system, and other influential international jurisdictions.

Legal Research & Writing

Your introduction to legal problem scenarios. It will teach you how to use credible sources, reference, and writing style requirements.

Criminal Law

This course provides an introduction to criminal offences and procedure. In Crim A you will learn about the elements of an offence, murder and manslaughter.

In Crim B you will learn about assault and property offences, defences and liability. You will apply this knowledge to solve legal problems both orally and in writing.

Legal Process & Statutory Interpretation

In this course you will develop a critical understanding of the institutions and practices fundamental to the law in Australia. Statutory interpretation is an essential skill that will be developed throughout the duration of your degree.

Get ready to read some cases!

Most practicable for ipad users, Goodnotes allows you to make handwritten notes, annotate photos and draw diagrams. Providing a range of templates, this app is perfect for those trying to transition into a paper - free study space



Notion

The perfect 'centre hub' for your desktop space. Increasingly customisable, Notion lets you create to do lists, tables, databases and more. Students can even simplify their course outlines under relevant headings.



Scannable

Using the camera on your phone or tablet, Scannable converts pages from your textbook into a pdf or jpeg format. Not only does this allow you to annotate but also make textbooks more portable



Pen or Paper?

During your first couple of weeks at uni you will have soon realised how much content gets packed into a three hour lecture and find yourself questioning your ability to physically write it all down. My advice is to embrace the best of both worlds! To stay more engaged in lectures, attempt to just have a pen and paper in front of you to draw quick diagrams and notes from your lecturer. It is possible to go back home after the class and articulate all of your handwritten notes onto your device.





Turtitin is a plagiarism detection software that scans your document through Blackboard. Once uploaded compares it to published works, submissions made by students at Notre Dame and other universities and websites. Typically, Blackboard will allows you to upload your submission three times before the due date to show you a 'Similarity percentage' as well as highlighting specific sections of your submission and show a comparison to other sources.

One day as it comes

As one starts a new year at university, over time they might be overwhelmed by the increasing pressure of exams and homework to be completed in one go. I found that to combat this issue I set day to day tasks which allowed me to set further goals and not feel so overwhelmed with work. Writing individual tasks per fay in a notebook or diary helps as you feel enlightened after all the tasks have been completed. As a suggestion, I found personally taking about 1 hour class to review what we learnt during the lecture. This allows further development in the understanding of the class and being able to review the textbook to understand what you learnt in the lecture

Understanding Limitations

Main thing: constant routine during uni hours, in the morning and at night time allows a balanced routine. Maintaining Online Respect

- Remember to always have your camera on and microphone on, as our lecturers might find it lonely looking back at a black screen
- Remember to maintain conversation with the microphone rather than tecxt typing. It allows better communications in the long run when it comes to assisstance by lecturers as they can see you are interested in the conversation
- Before speaking, raise your hand on the zoom. It allows flow in a conversation and does not interrupt when someone is speaking
- Remind yourself to set reminders before attending the zoom or classes on blackboard



Competitions

Negotiations

In a mock mediation session, you will act as a solicitor and attempt to resolve a dispute. The objective is to avoid an entrenched position while improving your reasoning by getting your opponent to agree to an outcome in the best interests of your client.

Client Interview

You will be required to apply a given legal rule to a set of facts in the most straightforward way. You will be provided with a brief and will be required to conduct an interview with your client, before providing them with advice.

Witness Examination

You will act as counsel in a simulated civil or criminal trial and be required to examine and interrogate witnesses to uncover the 'facts' and find logical solutions to a particular legal problem. Witnesses will be required to testify and face crossexamination.

Mooting

A moot is a simulated appeal in a superior court, based on a mock fact scenario and judgement from a lower court. It will involve legal debate regarding whether the lower court made the correct decision.

Paper Presentation

Helps you build up both your written and oral communication skills in a legal context. Two components are involved: a written paper on a legal issue and a presentation of that paper to an audience and a panel of judges.

Competitors are required to submit a paper of 2000-3000 words in length - this does not need to be written specifically for the competition, and can be a modified essay from an assessment.
